
School Improvement Update

Construction is well underway at both Mount Greenwood and Esmond Elementary Schools. The projects, with a combined forty million dollar budget, will address severe overcrowding at Mount Greenwood and unsafe learning conditions at Esmond. A status update and full project overview, provided by the Public Building Commission of Chicago (PBC), can be found below. The PBC expects new buildings at both campuses to be usable in 2019.

New Annex Building at Mount Greenwood Elementary School



A new, two-story annex to the existing two-story school will constructed to alleviate overcrowding. The annex will include thirteen standard classrooms, one science room, two offices, storage, bathrooms, utility rooms, an elevator and building support space. The project will also include a new parking lot, storm water management infrastructure, and a new outdoor playground. Work within the school building



will include the conversion of two existing classrooms for expanded lunchroom capacity.

Site preparation and utility work have been completed for this project. Contractors are currently working on the foundation for the new annex; that phase of construction is scheduled for completion later this month. The construction contract has been awarded and contractors are currently in the permitting process.

Esmond Elementary School Annex & Renovations:

A new, two-story annex to the existing two-story school will replace a deteriorating stand-alone modular building. The annex will

include a classroom, computer classroom, science classroom, art room with storage, library, dining room, hybrid kitchen and server, administrative office, bathrooms, building storage, an elevator and building support space. The project will also include renovated parking lots, load area, refuse enclosure, storm water management infrastructure, a new outdoor playground, community garden, and a turf field.

Site preparation and utility work has been completed for this project. A construction contract for the new building has been awarded. This project is currently in the permitting process.

Get Behind the Vest Pancake Breakfast - 2/18

19th Ward Alderman Matthew O'Shea will host his fourth annual pancake breakfast benefiting the Chicago Police Memorial Foundation's "Get Behind the Vest" initiative, on Sunday, February 18, 2018, at Saint John Fisher School, 10200 S. Washtenaw Ave., from 8:00 am - 12:00 pm.

Admission is \$5 per person or \$25 for families. All money raised will be donated to the Chicago Police Memorial Foundation's Get behind the Vest initiative, which actively raises funds to replace bullet proof vests for Chicago Police officers.

Ald. O'Shea began hosting the pancake breakfast in 2015, and together with school fundraisers throughout the Beverly, Mount Greenwood and Morgan Park community, has raised nearly \$80,000 for the Get Behind the Vest initiative. The 2017 event

was the largest event to date with \$26,000 donated from the pancake breakfast and school fundraisers.

In addition to the pancake breakfast, Ald. O'Shea will once

again be working with local schools to organize "dress down days" and other student-based fundraisers to raise additional funds for bullet proof vests.

Kean Gas Station, located at 2632 West 111th Street, will be donating .5 cents

for every gallon sold between February 10th - 17th, to the Get Behind the Vest efforts. Kean Gas Station is family-owned and the only remaining full-service gas station in the city of Chicago.

"This event is so important to police officers and their families,

as it helps to ensure the safety of officers and that they will return home to their families at the end of each shift," said Alderman O'Shea. "It is amazing how this event has

grown over the past four years, and we hope to raise even more money this year. Through the tremendous support of the community, schools, and local businesses such as Original Pancake House and Kean Gas Station, we want

to help in protecting those who protect us."

Bullet proof vests need to be replaced every five years, at a cost to police officers of about five hundred dollars or more. Over the past five years, the Chicago Police Memorial Foundation has replaced 8,000 outdated bullet proof vests in use by Chicago Police Officers. The organization now works to provide an additional five hundred vests per year to help ensure the safety of our officers. To date, 43 Chicago Police officers' lives have been saved by bullet proof vests. Last year, 125 officers were killed in the line of duty nationwide, with 45 of those lives being taken by gunfire.

Ald. O'Shea sits on the Chicago Police Memorial Foundation Advisory Board and the Chicago Police Chaplains Ministry Board of Directors. He represents the communities of Beverly Morgan Park and Mount Greenwood, where thousands of first responders reside.

The pancake breakfast is generously supported and cohosted by the Original Pancake House - Beverly. All pancake batter, condiments and cooking supplies will be donated by the Harrigan Family, who have operated the Original Pancake House for more than fifty years. Additional sponsors include the Beverly Area Planning Association, Senator Bill Cunningham, State Representative Fran Hurley, Saint John Fisher Parish, 19th Ward Youth Foundation and Mullen's Apple Sauce.





New Lighting Coming to Arterial Streets

See Chicago in a Whole New Light! The City of Chicago Smart Lighting Program is installing better quality, more reliable LED light fixtures on streets, alleys and viaducts to increase safety, reduce energy costs and improve the environment. The city-wide lighting initiative will replace over 270,000 existing outdated High Pressure Sodium (HPS) light fixtures with new energy efficient LED lights and create a modern lighting management system to streamline maintenance and repairs. This program will also include a limited amount

of pole replacement and wiring repairs to stabilize the lighting.

This Summer, Chicago Smart Lighting is coming to the 19th Ward with replacement of lighting fixtures on the Western Avenue, 111th Street and 95th Street commercial strips. This work is the first step in a multi-year project that will eventually include the conversion of all street and alley lights in the 19th Ward. row donation and you will have an opportunity to help save lives by joining the registry. Completion of a registration form and cheek swab will be done by those who wish to join.


Be sure to eat a healthy meal (low-fat and iron rich foods) at least two hours before donating blood and drink plenty of non-caffeinated beverages in the days leading up to your donation. Do not smoke for at least one hour before donating and do not chew gum, mints or candy immediately before or during your appointment. Also, avoid exercise or strenuous activity before and immediately after donat-

ing. On the day of your donation, please make sure to bring a valid driver's license, passport, state ID, or birth certificate with accompanying photo ID. A student or employee ID

with full name and photo are also accepted. You will also need a list of medications you are taking and list of places visited outside the United States in the past three years.

Community concerns about cancer prompt University of Chicago study in 19th Ward

In response to inquiries from local medical professionals and concerned residents, the University of Chicago has agreed to bring a comprehensive cancer and chronic disease study to the 19th Ward.

The Chicago Multiethnic Prevention and Surveillance Study (COMPASS) is designed by researchers at the University of Chicago Medicine Comprehensive Cancer Center to understand how lifestyle, healthcare delivery, environment, and genetics affect health.

COMPASS aims to determine why certain population groups in the city of Chicago have higher rates of occurrence of cancer and chronic diseases than others.

"Both medical professionals and elected officials in our area have received numerous inquiries about what seems to be the frequent occurrence of certain cancers in the community," said State Senator Bill Cunningham. "Unfortunately, public health agencies have been unable to reach any conclusive findings on the matter. Having a prestigious research institution like the U. of C. conduct a formal health survey in the community should help end speculation and provide us with some hard data."

Last year, Senator Bill Cunningham, State Representatives Fran Hurley and Kelly Burke, and Alderman Matt O'Shea held a series of meetings with constituents and local medical professionals about the possibility of a "cancer cluster" existing in the area after several children in our community were diagnosed with various forms of cancer.

The meetings spurred a request to the Chicago Department of Health and the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) to conduct a review of reports of cancer in the area. IDPH subsequently conducted and released an "Epidemiological Report" covering Mount Greenwood, Morgan Park, Beverly, Evergreen Park and Oak Lawn that looked at reports of cancer from 2005 to 2014. IDPH found that there was no evidence to suggest an abnormal number of pediatric cancer incidents in our community or any of the surrounding communities.

However, the IDPH report did find elevated occurrence of breast, lung, and prostate cancer in the area compared to levels reported in Cook County as a whole. The report did not offer any explanation for the increase incidents of those cancers "Even though the IDPH report did not find elevated incidents of pediatric cancer, we still have a number of unanswered questions about cancer in our community," Hurley said. "The U. of C. study will examine whether certain behavioral or environmental risks are affecting our health."

Alderman O'Shea credited two local medical professionals, Dr. Moira McQuillan and Dr. Briseis Aschebrook-Kilfoy, an epidemiologist at the University of Chicago, with spearheading efforts to formally research cancer occurrences in the area.

"We are lucky to have neighbors who are willing to use their professional training and expertise to protect the health of our community," O'Shea said. "Without their efforts, the 19th Ward would not have been chosen for this study."


As part of the COMPASS study, U of C researchers are working in various Chicago neighborhoods to recruit study participants. Eligible participants are asked to complete a specially designed interview (questions about lifestyle, environmental exposure, and medical history), and to provide a blood and urine sample. Radon and drinking water tests in various homes may


also be conducted. Participants are also asked to fill out a follow-up questionnaire every two to three years to obtain updated health information.

The goal of COMPASS is not to diagnose cancer among individual participants, but to identify what behavior and environmental exposure might cause disease across different population sub-groups, which will help U of C to develop new strategies to prevent cancer and other chronic diseases among Chicagoans.

"Thanks to the University of Chicago for dedicating staff and resources for this community study," said Representative Burke. "We all have friends, family, or neighbors who have battled cancer. I encourage 19th Ward residents to participate in the study. The results could lead to insights and answers on the rates of certain cancers in our neighborhood."

Program Trains Students for Careers in Police / Fire Departments

Do you know a high school student interested in becoming a police officer or firefighter? The Chicago Police and Firefighter Training Academy is hosting a recruiting event on Tuesday, March

6th from 6:00 pm to 7:30 pm at the Chicago High School for Agricultural Sciences. The Chicago Police and Firefighter Training Academy (CPFTA) program provides training for students interested in careers in public safety, law

enforcement, criminal justice, and fire science. The 2-year program was developed jointly by the Chicago Public Schools' Department of Career and Technical Education (CTE), the Chicago Police Department (CPD), Chicago Fire Department (CFD), and the City Colleges of Chicago (CCC). The program recruits and trains up to 250 public and non-public high school students each year. One of the immediate goals is to provide a pool of qualified applicants for the

city's police and fire academies.

The CPFTA program fulfills the two career education or elective credits that all CPS high school students need in order to graduate. The CPFTA curriculum allows

juniors and seniors who are city residents to

progress seamlessly from high school directly into any City College of Chicago to complete their Associate's degree.

In addition to high school and college training, students have the

opportunity to participate in a paid summer internship between junior and senior year to promote a better understanding of all aspects of careers in public safety. After completion of the two years in high school and two years at a city college, students will have met the minimum educational requirements to take the Chicago Police and Fire Department examinations for entry into their respective academies.


Russell Rhoads Case Progresses

On Thursday, February 2, 2017, the Chicago Police Department arrested Russell L. Rhoads at his home on the 10700 block of South Homan Ave. Rhoads, a 52-year-old white male, was found with images of child pornography, and has been charged with a Class X felony.

Alderman O'Shea has been in regular contact with the Cook County State's Attorney's Office to ensure our community is represented throughout the prosecution of this dangerous man. Mr. Rhoads will next appear in court on Thursday, March 1, 2018 at 9:30 a.m. in Room 206 at the George N. Leigh-

ton Criminal Courthouse at 2600 S. California Ave. Alderman O'Shea will be present for this court appearance; any resident who is interested in attending is encouraged to do so. Together, we can send a strong message that this behavior will not be tolerated in our community.

The entire community is grateful to the Chicago Police Department's Special Investigation Unit and the 22nd District, as well as the Cook County State's Attorney's Office for their efforts in this matter. Mr. Rhoads is clearly a threat to the safety of our children.

Hurley Passes Measure Aimed at Curbing Human Trafficking

Hoping to alert truck drivers to the warning signs of human trafficking, State Rep. Fran Hurley, D-Chicago, introduced House Bill 1677, now Public Act 100-0357, which requires curriculum on human trafficking for those obtaining their CDL license in Illinois. The bill became effective January 1, 2018.

"Truck drivers spend an enormous amount of time on our highways and roads, allowing them a unique perspective that can prove vital in the fight against human trafficking," said Hurley. "This law will help ensure our truck drivers have the information they need to

identify the warning signs of human trafficking, and take action to help prevent this form of outrageous exploitation."

Hurley hopes this bill will lead to increased reporting of activity that may be linked to human trafficking. "The only way we will ever be able to curb the tragedy of human trafficking is to ensure everyone is educated on ways to identify the warning signs," said Hurley. "Engaging truck drivers in the fight to eliminate human trafficking can make a dent in these heinous crimes."

You can also register and vote at the same time by visiting any early voting location. Please remember to bring two forms of ID when registering to vote.

19th Ward Seeks Election Judges

The 19th Ward is currently seeking Election Judges for the March 20th Primary Election. Judges of election are the officials who are responsible for the conduct of the election in the precinct polling place. Judges can make up to \$190 if they serve on Election Day and complete a pre-election training course.

In each polling place, judges share responsibilities for the following: (1) opening the polling place and setting up voting equipment at 5:00 am on Election Day, (2) conducting a fair, impartial and secure election in the polling place, allowing voting from 6:00 am to 7:00 pm, and (3) tabulating the vote totals for the precinct and transmitting the results to the Chicago

Board of Elections after the polls close at 7:00 pm.

Juniors and seniors in high school, as well as any college students, are also eligible to serve as students judges. To serve as a student judge, you must have a minimum 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale. Student judges receive the same pay as other election judges and can be a great experience for local young people.

Senior Property Tax Exemptions

The Cook County Assessor has mailed out applications for Senior Citizens to apply for property tax exemptions. Only residents who

have previously qualified for these cost saving programs will receive these applications in the mail.

Property owners who are eligible for the Senior Exemption and/or the Senior Freeze are required to fill out these forms in

order for the proper exemptions to appear on their second installment property tax bill. Anyone who was born in 1952 or earlier qualifies for the Senior Exemption. The senior exemption has

increased this year, raising the reduction in your equalized assessed value from \$5,000 to \$8,000, thanks



Echoing her sentiments was Smith Village resident Ethel Orszulak, whose son, Kenneth, a Marine, served in the Vietnam War. Orszulak, 95, showed great enthusiasm for making the Valentines and said, "I feel we should always support our troops. They are wonderful people."





Smith Village Trial Stay program attracts new residents

Thanks to Smith Village's Trial Stay program, several new residents of the life plan community at 2320 W. 113th Place found it easier to decide to become permanent residents.

"Having the chance to see what life was like at Smith Village eliminated my concerns about making a wrong choice," said Jacque Ward, one of a handful of seniors who opted to become permanent residents of Smith Village after enrolling in the Trial Stay program.

Ward grew up on Chicago's South Side, and her father built several homes in Beverly. Her hus-

band, Walter, now deceased, was a Chicago Police lieutenant. "I never lived North of 83rd Street," said Ward, who graduated from Calumet High School.

After her Trial Stay ended, Ward paid her entrance fee for permanent residency. "Everybody was so nice here, I just decided to stay," she said.

Soon after, Ward moved her furniture and belongings into her permanent one-bedroom apartment plus den with a view of a courtyard. She selected paint colors for the walls—seafoam green, light blue and peach—and new flooring and carpeting. Her den is flooded with natural light, which allows her to pursue a variety of creative interests—sewing and needlepoint; painting and jewelry making.

Making big decisions easier

"Relocating is a big decision," said Marti Jatis, Smith Village executive director. "So, we're pleased to offer a program which makes it possible for prospective residents to spend some time with us and get a real sense of our community. Many Smith Village residents hail from the 19th Ward and nearby suburbs. So, when people stay with us, they're thrilled to discover their neighbors from across the street, members of their parish, or the parents of children their chil-

dren played with while growing up. Sometimes they reconnect with old schoolmates."

Trial Stay participants pay a standard monthly fee to live in a fully furnished apartment with a convenient kitchen equipped with dishware, a washer and dryer, and linens. Housekeeping service is provided bi-weekly, just as it is for permanent residents.

The Trial Stay program also includes access to activities, programs, services and amenities enjoyed by independent living residents. "We think it's a great way for people to experience all we have to offer," said Jatis. "We offer onsite entertainment, craft and horticulture workshops, field trips including transportation, and delicious, healthy meals prepared by our executive chef. We encourage Trial Stay residents to entertain their

family and friends in our private dining rooms, and make use of our library, craft room and meeting spaces. Many choose to attend religious services offered onsite every week."

With a doctor's okay, temporary residents can participate in the fitness program. Smith Village's wellness center, includes a salon, spa, workout room and space for exercise classes. Smith Village also features an onsite movie theater.

Smith Village also offers a rental program, which requires no entrance fee, for a limited number of independent living apartments. The rental program does not offer the healthcare benefit package providing discounted pricing for higher levels of care in the future.
