

Mayor Emanuel and Alderman O'Shea Break Ground on Community Investments Across the South West Side

Mayor Rahm Emanuel and 19th Ward Alderman Matt O'Shea today joined the Chicago Park District, Chicago Public Schools and the Public Building Commission on the southwest side to break ground on the Beverly Park Playground, and annexes at Esmond Elementary School and Mt. Greenwood Elementary School.

"This series of investments on the southwest side will create the state-of-the-art facilities and extra space necessary to support the future of our children and the future of our city," said Mayor Emanuel. "Together with Alderman O'Shea, we are proud to make smart, critical investments that help both students and residents to strengthen the social fabric of this community."

"Ongoing investments in our parks and our schools are a sign of what's to come in Beverly, Morgan Park and Mt. Greenwood," said Alderman Matt O'Shea, 19th Ward. "These projects will not only benefit our children, they will become community staples that benefit our residents for generations to come."

The Beverly Park Playground will undergo significant renovations. Once construction is complete, the playground will house new play equipment for children ages 2 - 12, including swing set, net climbers а and a spinning play feature. Improvements include new artificial turf surfacing, a new asphalt ramp leading into the playground, new park signage and modifications to the existing timber walls. The adjacent spray pool on the northwest corner of the park will remain.

"Neighborhood playgrounds are valuable resources that strengthen our communities and enrich the lives of every individual that visits our parks," said Chicago Park District

Superintendent & CEO Michael P. Kelly. "Today, we are not only investing in these resources, but also in our future generations." The state-of-the-art

improvements made to the playground will align with ADA accessibility guidelines. The project is expected to be complete by September 2018.

Two annexes at Esmond Elementary School and Mt. Greenwood Elementary

School will be built in the Morgan Park and Mount Greenwood neighborhoods. Both annexes are expected to be complete by January 2019.

"The annexes at Esmond and Mount Greenwood Elementary will create extra space and state-ofthe-art learning facilities necessary for our students to learn, grow, and thrive," said CPS CEO Dr. Janice K. Jackson. "These investments will provide engaging learning opportunities for generations to come."

School in Morgan Park will replace a deteriorating stand-alone modular building. The annex will include a classroom, computer lab, science lab, art room with storage, library, dining room, hybrid kitchen and dining area, administrative office, bathrooms, building storage, an elevator and building support space. The project will also include a renovated parking lot, load area, refuse enclosure, storm water management infrastructure, a new outdoor playground, community garden, and a turf field. Renovations to the existing building include a new roof and repairs to the exterior envelope.

The two-story 27,000 square foot annex at Mt. Greenwood Elementary School in Mount Greenwood will include thirteen standard classrooms, a science lab, offices, storage and utility rooms, bathrooms and an elevator. Work within the school building will include converting two existing classrooms for expanded lunchroom capacity. The project will also include a new outdoor playground, a new parking lot and storm water management infrastructure. "Nothing gives me greater joy to know that we are partnering with CPS to develop new annexes that will provide students with the resources necessary for a 21st century education," said Carina E. Sanchez, Executive Director of the Public Building Commission of Chicago. "The new annexes

support the Mayor's vision of providing high quality public education for every child, in every neighborhood, to ensure that they all have access to an education that will aid in their success - whether it is in their academic, professional, or civic life."

These investments build on several upcoming and completed projects on the southwest side since 2011. Opened in 2015, the 64,000 square foot Morgan Park Sports Center features a state of the art indoor ice rink facility and a world-class gymnastics center with concession areas, meeting and party rooms, viewing areas, offices, restrooms and team locker rooms. Mt. Greenwood Park last year was updated with a new walking path and outdoor exercise equipment. Upcoming projects include the addition of a new water feature at Graver Park.

Mayor Emanuel and CPS have addressed overcrowding at over 35 local schools in recent years, including Skinner West, Zapata, Dore, Dawes, South Loop, Prussing, Addams, Little Village, Bridge, Onahan, Ebinger, Pasteur, Canty, Byrne, Edwards, Dore, Garvey, Hale, Peck, Stevenson, Dirksen, Sauganash, and many more. The Mayor remains committed to working with communities to find innovative ways to relieve overcrowding. Under Mayor Emanuel's leadership, there have been investments in neighborhoods across the city including \$3.2 billion in school infrastructure and \$1 billion in parks since 2011. Investments with CPS has included new schools and annexes, playgrounds and air conditioning, improvements and access to technology, new computers and expanded bandwidth, expanded academic programs and core facilities investments.





Get ready to march in the Memorial Day Parade May 28

Beverly Area Planning Association (BAPA) will present the annual Beverly/Morgan Park/ Mount Greenwood Memorial Day Parade on Mon., May 28. The parade will step off at about 10 a.m. from 110th Place and Longwood Drive, following the Ridge Run 5K, and march north to Ridge Park, 97th and Longwood Drive.

This year's parade Grand Marshals are members of the American Gold Star Mothers, a national group mothers whose children lost their lives while serving in the United States Armed Forces. Their presence in the parade is a reminder that Memorial Day is about honoring those killed while fighting for our country. All area Gold Star Mothers are welcome to help lead the parade.

Prior to the parade, the Gold Star Mothers will be honored at the Memorial Day Ceremony at Ridge Park. The ceremony begins at 9 a.m., and features taps, a color guard, the laying of the wreath and a short program. The Gold Star Mothers organization was founded in 1928 by a group of 25 mothers whose children were killed in military service in World War I. The group is nondenominational, non-profit and politically unaffiliated. Area groups, families, organizations and businesses are encouraged to march behind the Grand Marshals.

The Road Home Program at Rush University Medical Center returns as Memorial Day Parade Presenting Sponsor. The Road Home Program provides individualized care to veterans and their families to help heal the "invisible wounds of war." The program is committed to helping all veterans returning home to address service and combatrelated health issues as well as familial challenges.

The Parade will feature the Jesse White Tumbles as well as military vehicles, a color guard, scout troops, historical figures, floats, vehicles, flags and music. The parade is one of Chicago's oldest community

O'Shea Invites Residents to Help-A-Hero

This June, Alderman Matt O'Shea, Jewel-Osco, and the Chicago Park District will host the second annual Operation Help-A-Hero, a household item collection drive supporting veterans transitioning out of homelessness. On any given night, there are over 600 homeless veterans living on the streets of Chicago. While we have helped over 4,000 formerly homeless veterans find permanent housing, many still lack the most basic household items needed to live independently.

Operation Help-A-Hero asks all

Chicagoans to consider purchasing one or more of these items to donate to a veteran in need. Donations will be accepted at any Jewel-Osco store in the City, as well as all local Aldermanic offices and select Chicago Park District locations during the month of June. All items collected will be delivered to the United States' Veteran's Affairs Office and distributed to qualifying veterans.

Local drop off locations include the Jewel-Osco store at 3128 W. 103rd Street, Alderman O'Shea's office at 10400 S. Western Avenue, Monday - Friday from 9:00am - 5:00pm, and Mount Greenwood Park, 3721 W. 111th Street, Monday - Friday from 10:00am - 10:00pm, Saturday from 9:00am - 2:00pm, and Sunday from 9:00am - 5:00pm. 

Bike Sharing Pilot Comes to the 19th Ward

Alderman Matt O'Shea and the City of Chicago are excited to announce a dockless bike sharing pilot program to service several southwest side communities including Beverly, Morgan Park

and Mount Greenwood. The pilot program will operate from May 1, 2018 through November 1, 2018 and will help the Chicago Department of Transportation better develop a city-

wide policy on this growing industry. Several vendors have already expressed a strong interest in participating.

Under the pilot, vendors are allowed to distribute a maximum of 250 bikes throughout the program boundaries. Starting July 1, 2018, all bikes must include "lock to" technology, which requires the bike to be attached to a fixed object at the end of each rental trip. Vendors are required to make bikes available for rent 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and ensure that all bikes include clearly readable contact information including a toll free telephone number with round the clock cus-

tomer service and an email address. Vendors are also responsible for ensuring the bicycles are maintained and meet safety standards.

Bike sharing has been no-

ticeably absent in our community since the launch of Divvy in 2013. The Beverly Area Planning Association spearheaded a petition drive in support of bike sharing coming to the neighborhood with tremendous community support. 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Parjana Pilot Project Update

In May 2017, the Parjana Distribution Company installed its Energy-passive Groundwater Recharge Product (EGRP) at Mount Greenwood Park. This pilot study, which is the result of a partnership between Alderman Matt O'Shea, the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD), and the Chicago Park District, is intended to evaluate technology that addresses drainage issues through improved infiltration of storm water runoff. Since the installation, MWRD and the Park District have been monitoring the effectiveness of the EGRP system, and while this effort is still ongoing, the preliminary results appear to be positive.

Specifically, from initial soil moisture measurements the top 8 inches of soil appears 10 to 12 percent drier in the fields where the EGRP devices were installed than the control fields after storm events. MWRD is analyzing all data collected to date and will continue to monitor the fields to assess long-term performance of this experimental system. Further results from the ongoing data collection and analysis will be summarized and provided as soon as it's available. Chicago Park District field staff have also reiterated that they noticed less standing water after rains and reported that fewer games were cancelled in 2017 than in past years.

Smart Lighting Comes to the 19th Ward

Residents are you ready to "See Chicago in a Whole New Light! The City of Chicago Smart Lighting Program is installing better quality, more reliable LED light fixtures on streets, alleys and viaducts to increase safety, reduce energy costs and improve the environment. The city-wide lighting initiative will replace over 270,000 existing outdated High Pressure Sodium (HPS) light fixtures with new energy efficient LED lights and create a modern lighting management system to streamline maintenance and repairs over the course of four years. This program will also in-

clude a limited amount of pole replacement and wiring repairs to stabilize the lighting. Please visit chicagosmartlighting.org to view the updated installation map and additional program information that is updated weekly."

The contractor will be installing along 19th Ward arterial locations within 4-6 weeks. Cook County Assessor Property Tax Appeal

2018 is a triennial assessment year, make sure to file an appeal through the Cook County Assessor. Property tax appeal process for Lake Township, which includes the 19th Ward, is tentatively scheduled to open July 27, 2018. Yearly assessment notices will be mailed notifying residents of the 30 day window to file an appeal. This will be the first opportunity to appeal 2018 taxes payable in 2019. The second option to appeal is administered through the Cook County Board of Review, which typically opens in the fall. Look for more information about the Board of Review appeal process in the August Quarterly. It can be beneficial to file appeals with both agencies. C o m m o n reasons to file an appeal with the Assessor are lack of uniformity with similar properties within the same neighborhood code, overvaluation based on recent sales and significant property description errors. This appeal process is for 2018 property taxes which are due in 2019. Appeals can be made in person at any Cook County Assessor office, online at www.cookcountyassessor.com or appeal forms are available at both 19th Ward offices.

Demolition is expected to begin shortly on this project, which will consolidate two play areas into one. The new playground will include poured in place soft surface, similar to what is seen at Mount Greenwood Park. Construction is tentatively scheduled to begin in July and continue into October. The total budget for this improvement is \$500,000.

Graver Park Water Feature

Crews are currently on site at Graver Park replacing the water feature. Work is expected to be completed in time for the start of day camp. The total budget for this improvement is \$140,000.



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Hurley Sponsors Legislation to Increase Early Breast Cancer Detection

Women would have access to vital medical information that could increase early breast cancer detection rates under legislation sponsored by State Rep. Fran Hurley (D-35). House Bill 4392 requires every provider of mammography services to inform women of their dense breast tissue and the risk factors.

Statistics have shown that

mammograms miss more than 50% of cancers in dense breast tissue, and 70% of breast cancers are found in dense breasts.

"Dense breast tissue is quite common, and is often not considered abnormal," Hurley said. "However, dense breast tissue can make it harder to find cancer on a mammogram and

may also be associated with an increased risk of breast cancer. This legislation will raise patients' awareness of risks associated with dense breast tissue."

Patti Beyer, an advocate for the legislation and survivor of breast cancer, brought the legislation to Hurley who immediately signed on as chief co-sponsor. Beyer shared testimony before the House Human Services Committee in April on the importance of mammography providers to inform women of



their dense breast tissue. Beyer, like so many other women, had never been given any information about her breast density. Although Beyer's mammogram results were considered "normal," only an ultrasound she requested pointed to "an area of concern." A biopsy then showed she had invasive breast cancer.

Because of her personal experience, Beyer launched The

Illinois Breast Density Initiative, which aims to advance breast density inform laws in the U.S.

"The Breast Density Inform Law would give every woman in Illinois the opportunity for access to an early-stage diagnosis of breast cancer, if cancer is present," said Hurley. "Women cannot be active

participants in their own breast health unless they have been informed and notified through conversation with their doctor."

Currently, HB 4392 is scheduled for debate on the House Floor. Over 30 states have already passed breast density inform laws. Passage of the bill would increase chances for early-stage breast cancer diagnosis. Hurley is an advocate for women's health and will continue to fight for policies that benefit women across Illinois.

Cunningham measure cracks down on school violence threats on social media, expands mental health evaluations

Individuals who threaten gun violence against schools on social media would be required to reimburse police departments for added security and emergency response costs under legislation introduced this spring by State Senator Bill Cunningham.

The legislation, Senate Bill 563, is aimed at reducing the trend

of copycat threats in the wake of school shootings by updating the disorderly conduct statute, which is the state law most often used to prosecute individuals who make threats against schools. Under current law, those convicted of making threats are required to reimburse public safety agencies response-related for costs, but only if they

make the threat via a 9-1-1 phone call or if they specifically threaten to use a bomb.

"Most threats of violence against schools are no longer made through a phone call and increasingly, the threats make no mention of a bomb," Cunningham said. "According to law enforcement agencies in my district, threats against schools are more commonly made via social media posts. The law needs to be updated to address this change."

In an additional effort to combat school shooting, the legislation would also give police departments the ability to immediately bring individuals who make threats against a school to a hospital for a

psychiatric evaluation.

"The burden for determining whether a threat against a school is legitimate or just a prank should not fall solely on the police," Cunningham said. "We need to empower our law enforcement and healthcare providers to work together and provide that safety net." drafting In legislation, the

Cunningham worked

closely with Palos Hills Police Chief Paul Madigan, whose department heightened security measures at local schools four times this year due to threats on social media.

In some cases throughout the country, school administrators have ordered school closures as a pre-emptive measure following online threats.





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


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Beverly/Morgan Park Home Tour Showcases Neighborhood Lifestyle Built Around Rock Island Stations

The homes also show the inextricable impact the opening of the Rock Island Railroad's service to this area made on the creation and expansion of the community we now know as Beverly/Morgan Park. A True Commuter Community

Beverly/Morgan Park would not exist today had it not been for the Chicago and Rock Island Railroad (now the Metra Rock Island). When the Rock began daily commuter service downtown nearly 150 years ago, the sparsely settled areas along the Blue Island Ridge that became Beverly/Morgan Park began attracting people who desired homes in a "suburban" setting but accessible to jobs and shopping, as well as railroad workers and service providers in need of lodging close to station stops.

Home construction on the Ridge boomed following the Great Chicago Fire in 1871. From mansions that housed some of Chicago's most prominent families, to cottages and bungalows for families of more modest means, quick transportation downtown was a key influencer for home buyers more than a century ago, just as it is for buyers today. Many of the stations, now located at four-block intervals from 91st to 115th Streets, served as village centers for shopping, and the surviving stations built in the late 1800s and early 1900s form the Rock Island Train Station historic district because of their historic and architectural significance. All of the stations are part of daily life for the estimated 8.3 million riders currently commuting between Joliet and LaSalle Street each year.



Sister Maryellen Callahan leads 'value-centered Christian education' at St. Angela School Tearing down to build up a vibrant parish school on Chicago's West Side

Most days Sister Maryellen Callahan RSM, leaves her apartment at Mercy Circle just before dawn. She plans for about an hour's drive to Chicago's Austin neighborhood where she is president and guidance counselor for St. Angela's elementary school, serving about 255 pre-kindergarten through 8th grade students.

A passer-by might think of St. Angela's School, at 1332 N. Massasoit as an ongoing construction site, but Sister Maryellen knows it's more like a



transformation.

"We are developing an open space where three buildings—a rectory, a church and a convent had served this community for many decades. Soon, we'll have a baseball field, a track and an outside classroom," she explains.

"Our plans are to develop outdoor spaces where children can learn, pray, play and relax – and we're very excited. We took first steps last fall with some sod, trees and landscape materials and volunteers are helping us to take some big steps forward this spring," says Lynn Fredrick, director of development at St. Angela school.

Sister Maryellen has been counseling, teaching, and working in administration and development at the school for 25 years. She emphasizes the ministry is enjoyable because her students continue to thrive. "Many of our graduates go to Fenwick High School in Oak Park," she says, "but some attend St. Ignatius or other top Chicago public high schools including Whitney Young and Lane Tech." There is satisfaction for Sister Maryellen, who grew up on the West Side-attending St. Thomas Aquinas grammar school (now St. Martin de Porres) and Siena Catholic High School for girls-to witness the redevelopment and renewal at St. Angela's community.
