

# **O'Shea Invites Residents to Help A Hero**

This June, Alderman Matt O'Shea, the Chicago Park District, and Jewel-Osco will host the 4th Annual Operation Help-A-Hero, a household item collection drive supporting veterans transitioning out of homelessness in Chicago. On any given night, there are approximately 1,000 homeless Veterans in the City. Since 2014, thousands of these American heroes have found permanent housing; unfortunately, many still lack the most basic household items you and I take for granted each day.

Operation Help-A-Hero asks all

Chicagoans to consider purchasing one or more of these items to donate to a veteran in need. Donations will be accepted at any Jewel-Osco location in Chicago or at sixty-five Aldermanic Offices and Chicago Park District locations throughout the City during the month of June. All items collected will be delivered to the United States' Veteran's Affairs Office and distributed to qualifying veterans throughout the Chicagoland area.

Local drop off locations include the 19th Ward Office at 10400 S. Western Ave., Monday through Friday from 9:00am - 5:00pm, and Mount Greenwood Park, 3721 W. 111th St., Monday through Friday from 10:00am - 10:00pm, Saturday from 9:00am - 2:00pm, and Sunday from 9:00am - 5:00pm. Despite recent progress on this issue, there are currently hundreds of homeless veterans who live either unsheltered or in shelters throughout the City. "It is our duty as citizens to help our veterans in need get back on their feet and successful in private life." said O'Shea.

PERSONAL HYGIENE: bath soap, shampoo, conditioner, razors, shaving cream, deodorant, combs, hair brushes, nail clippers, toothpaste, toothbrushes; KITCHEN & CLEANING ITEMS: kitchen trash cans (plastic), Windex, Pine Sol, dishwashing liquid, dishcloths, sponges, mops, buckets, brooms, dustpans, paper towels; BATHROOM & MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS: shower curtains, toilet paper (4 or 6 pack), plungers, toilet brushes, toilet bowl cleaner, bath towels (2), wash cloths, smoke detectors w/ batteries, flashlights w/ batteries, garbage bags, laundry baskets, hampers, and laundry detergent.

# **Cook County Assessor Property Tax Appeals**

The Cook County Assessor 19th property tax appeal process for ber Lake Township, which includes the age 19th Ward, is tentatively scheduled an a to open August 12, 2019. Yearly assessment notices will be mailed notifying residents of the 30 day window to file an appeal. This will be the first opportunity to

first opportunity to appeal 2019 taxes payable in 2020. The second opportunity to appeal property taxes is administered

through the Cook County Board of Review, which opens in late Fall, 2019. Look for more information about the Board of Review appeal process in the August issue of the 19th Ward Quarterly. It can be beneficial to file appeals with both agencies. Common reasons to file an appeal with the Assessor are lack of uniformity with similar properties within the same neighborhood code, overvaluation based on recent sales

and significant property description errors. This appeal process is for 2019 property taxes due in

2020. Appeals can be filed in person at any Cook County Assessor office or

online at www.cookcountyassessorollice of com. Appeal forms are available at the 19th Ward Service Office.



# **Divvy Expansion Planned**


Divvy is expanding and coming soon to the 19th Ward! A proposal recently passed City Council to enable Divvy, Chicago's bike share system, to reach all 50 wards of Chicago and more than double their current fleet with 10,500 new ebikes. Alderman O'Shea will work closely with Divvy and CDOT when bringing these new bike stations and bikes to the 19th Ward. Other aspects of the expansion include 200 new jobs in Chicago, a summer youth job training program, and expanding the current Divvy for Everyone \$5/ year membership program for lowincome residents. We are pleased to soon be able to bring bike share as a convenient, affordable, and sustainable transportation option to our community.



- 175 new stations and 10,500 new ebikes to be added bringing the fleet to 16,500
- Divvy will reach all 50 wards of Chicago by 2021, with 2019 focusing on the far South Side
- Divvy will be integrated with the Ventra app
- 10 million dollar investment to expand the current Divvy for Everyone program bringing \$5/ year membership program for low-income residents
- A new adaptive bike share program by 2020
- Add 200 new jobs plus job training and outreach to barrier communities

# **Meet Shea McGillycuddy**

Shea Leo McGillycuddy lives with his family in the West Beverly community. He was first diagnosed with Severe Hemophilia Type A in the NICU at Advocate Christ Medical Center, when he was one day old and the customary heel prick test failed to stop bleeding! Shea suffered two brain bleeds before he was 18 months old, one of which caused mini seizures. He has since been given two PICC lines allowing medication to be administered at home. Thankfully modern medicine has come a long way in the treatment of hemophilia. However, thousands of patients across the country still rely on blood transfusions. #### What is Hemophilia?

Hemophilia is a rare disorder in which your blood doesn't clot normally because it lacks sufficient blood-clotting proteins (clotting factors). If you have hemophilia, you may bleed for a longer time after an injury than you would if your blood clotted normally.

Small cuts usually aren't much of a problem. The greater health concern is deep bleeding inside your body, especially in your knees, ankles and elbows. Internal bleeding can damage your organs and tissues, and may be life-threatening.

Hemophilia is an inherited (genetic) disorder. Treatment includes regular replacement of the specific clotting factor that is reduced.

#### Symptoms

Signs and symptoms of hemophilia vary, depending on your level of clotting factors. If your clotting-factor level is mildly reduced, you may bleed only after surgery or trauma. If your deficiency is severe, you may experience spontaneous bleeding.

Signs and symptoms of spontaneous bleeding include:

- Unexplained and excessive bleeding from cuts or injuries, or after dental work
- Many large or deep bruises
- Unusual bleeding after vaccinations
- Pain, swelling or tightness in your joints
- Blood in your urine or stool
- Nosebleeds without a known cause
- In infants, unexplained irritability

#### Bleeding into the brain

A simple bump on the head can cause bleeding into the brain for some people who have severe hemophilia. This rarely happens, but it's one of the most serious complications that can occur. Signs and symptoms include:

- Painful, prolonged headache
- Repeated vomiting
- Sleepiness or lethargy
- Double vision
- Sudden weakness or clumsiness

### Causes

Convulsions or seizures

When you bleed, your body normally pools blood cells together to form a clot to stop the bleeding. The clotting process is encouraged by certain blood particles. Hemophilia occurs when you have a deficiency in one of these clotting factors.

There are several types of hemophilia, and most forms are inherited. However, about 30 percent of people with hemophilia have no family history of the disorder. In these people, an unexpected change (spontaneous mutation) occurs in one of the genes associated with hemophilia.

### Complications of hemophilia may include:

**Deep internal bleeding.** Bleeding that occurs in deep muscle can cause your limbs to swell. The swelling may press on nerves and lead to numbness or pain.


**Damage to joints.** Internal bleeding may also put pressure on your joints, causing severe pain.



Left untreated, frequent internal bleeding may cause arthritis or destruction of the joint.

**Infection.** People with hemophilia are likelier to have blood transfusions, increasing their risk of receiving contaminated blood products. Blood products became safer after the mid-1980s due to screening of donated blood for hepatitis and HIV.

Adverse reaction to clotting factor treatment. In some people with hemophilia, the immune system has a negative reaction to the clotting factors used to treat bleeding. When this happens, the immune system develops proteins (known as inhibitors) that inactivate the clotting factors, making treatment less effective.



# Smart Lighting Comes to 19th Ward

The Department of Transportation has begun work on the second phase of Chicago's streetlight modernization program, which includes the installation of an additional 40,000 new LED in neighborhoods streetlights across the City. In this next phase, the Chicago Smart Lighting Program (CSLP) will install new LED lights on streets, alleys and viaducts in portions of the far South Side, including portions of the 19th Ward. Installations in the current phase will be continuing through August when the City expects to reach the halfway point of the fouryear project.

"This project has been a win-win for Chicagoans as it delivers one of the largest lighting modernization programs in the country and addresses one of the top reasons residents contact 311," Mayor Emanuel said. "As we begin this next phase, the program will reach more neighborhoods and provide more residents with reliable and energy-efficient nighttime lighting."

Last month, the Mayor was joined by ComEd in announcing that the City taxpayers will save an estimated \$100 million over the next ten years thanks to the energy efficiency of the new lights, which consume 50-75 percent less electricity than outdated High Pressure Sodium street lights. In addition, the modernization is earning the City rebates from ComEd for installing new energy efficient lights. The City has received more than \$12 million in rebates to date, and expects to earn a total of \$35 million in rebates over the four-year program.

The modernization is being implemented by the Chicago Department of Transportation (CDOT) in coordination with the Chicago Infrastructure Trust (CIT) and the Department of Innovation and Technology.

Chicagoans can track the installation of new street lights on an interactive map at the CSLP website: http://chicagosmartlighting.org. The map is updated weekly to show where installation is anticipated and already completed.

During the installation process, brief closures may be required on residential streets and alleys as crews move through each area. Parking restrictions, if needed, will be posted prior to installation. that is updated weekly.

## **Cunningham named** Legislator of the Year by **Fire Fighters Association**

State Senator Bill Cunningham was named Legislator of the Year by the Associated Fire Fighters of Illinois(IFFA) for his advocacy on behalf of firefighters and other first responders in the Illinois State Senate.

"I'm honored to be chosen for this award I want to thank the IFFA for its continued advocacy on behalf of Illinois firefighters," said Cunningham, who represents portions of Chicago and the southwest suburbs. "I look forward to continuing to work with the IFFA and first responders throughout the state to promote the interests of Illinois firefighters."

Cunningham has worked on behalf of first responders in Springfield since he first joined the General Assembly in 2011. Last session, he introduced legislation to protect Chicago firefighters' pensions by allowing them to transfer credit from their previous service to their current pensions. He's also sponsored legislation to extend "widows benefits" for the families of fallen firefighters and to strengthen fire safety standards in building codes.

"Illinois' firefighters put their own lives on the line on a daily basis to keep us safe," Cunningham said. "State government needs to look out for these brave men and women the way they look out for us."

# **Hurley Bill Protects First Responders**

Law enforcement officers who are struggling with trauma, PTSD or job-related stress would be able to access mental health services without fear of losing their job under legislation introduced by state Rep. inpatient mental health services, even if a clinician determines they pose no risk to themselves or others. Many departments, including the Chicago Police Department, require officers patrolling the streets to have a FOID card, meaning that those considering getting help are at risk of losing their position on the force. "I will continue

standing up for our police officers and first responders and working to address the recent rise in suicides and other mental health issues we are seeing in officers throughout the state," continued Hurley. "Removing existing barriers to mental health care will help

job and are under an incredible amount of stress as they work to keep our communities and families safe," said Hurley. "It is critical that support we

law enforcement and other first responders by providing them the resources they need to protect their mental and emotional well-being, while making sure they are not punished simply for seeking help."

Hurley's House Bill 2766 also would protect officers who seek help by ensuring that they do not automatically lose their job if their FOID card is revoked. Under current law, police officers' FOID cards can be revoked for seeking our heroes manage the immense stress they are under and break down the stigma around asking for help."

#### **Memorial Day Parade**

The Beverly/Morgan Park/ Mount Greenwood Memorial Day Parade, planned and presented by BAPA steps at about 10 a.m. The parade features a variety of units including military vehicles, antique cars, floats, scouts, bands, the Jesse White Tumblers and the Bluesmobile.

Beverly/Morgan Park resident Tim Noonan, founder of the Chicago Council of Gold Star Mothers (CCGSM), will lead the parade as Grand Marshal. The Road Home Program Center for Veterans and their Families at Rush University Medical Center is the parade presenting sponsor.

A few years ago, Noonan formed CCSGM with the mission of restoring and preserving a forgotten monument erected nearly a century ago to honor Chicagoans who gave their lives serving in World War I. His tireless efforts have led to the restoration of that monument, which was installed last fall in a place of honor in the Dan Ryan Woods and rededicated in an official ceremony in time for the 100th anniversary of the armistice that ended WWI.

The CCCSM relied on what Noonan called "blind faith" to get the project completed. They ordered a new bronze plaque from a Chicago manufacturer who, according to Noonan, used the same techniques employed on the long-lost original plaque. The International Union of Bricklayers and Allied Craftworkers guided the hands of apprentice masons in rebuilding the monument, also using century-old techniques, with the original stones supplemented by local stones collected by Noonan. The Forest Preserves District of Cook County built the new concrete footing for the memorial.

The CCGSM continues to raise funds to cover the costs of the restored memorial, and the costs of preserving the memorial as well as adding benches and amenities for visitors. This information will automatically display for dispatchers when the user dials 9-1-1. Currently, Smart911 is trusted by 32 million people in thousands of communities nationwide to stay safe.

#### How can you sign up?


Sign up at www.Smart911.com or download the free app in the iTunes & Google Play stores now and have life-saving capabilities at your fingertips, 24/7.

#### How can Smart911 keep your family safe?

Today, 75% of 911 calls are made from cell phones, making it difficult for call takers to determine the exact location of an emergency. By creating a Smart911 Safety Profile with up-to-date information, 911 dispatch staff is better prepared to help you and your family in an emergency.

When creating your Safety Profile, you can include things about:

• Allergies – Does someone in your family have an allergy to food or medication? 911 dispatchers will be able to immediately inform first responders.



- Autism Does your child have Autism? Do they have a tendency to wander or hide when scared? Uploading a photo and a physical description of your child makes them easier to locate in case of an emergency.
- Alzheimer's Do you have a parent or older relative living with you that suffers from Alzheimer's or dementia? First responders will be better prepared to help.
- Animals Do you have pets? This information can assist firefighters in their search to bring everyone, including your pets, to safety.
- **Hearing Impairments** Do you have a loved one who may be deaf, hard of hearing or nonverbal? A 9-1-1 operator can initiate a text message with a notification on Safety Profiles that text is preferred. In addition, if the caller is disconnected from the call or has poor cell phone coverage, a 9-1-1 operator can initiate a text to stay connected.
  - ...as well as **current medications, physical disability, mental health, home layout, emergency contacts,** and more.

Hood soon after he won the contest to design the Chicago Tribune Tower, and erected in 1926. It features carefully preserved Norman Gothic details and as well as a cloister Garth paved with Hudson River blue stone and featuring an open-air stone pulpit. Founded in 1872, Bethany Union Church will also be sharing artifacts and information about it's long and interesting local history.

Homes being showcased on the tour are:

• A stunning home built just ten years ago and designed with a contemporary Tudor influence that fits beautifully into the vintage character of the surrounding neighborhood. Inside the house is a spectacular combination of vintage amenities, contemporary lifestyle and carefully incorporated elements that make the house handicapped accessible to accommodate the needs of aging parents. From the basement party room with its expansive bar and sparkling

# **Smith Village recognizes value of Moraine Valley Community College CNA training:** new tuition-reimbursement program

When twin sisters, Jacquelene and Jocelyne Garcia, started working as servers at Smith Village in October of 2016, they were earning general education credits toward associate's degrees at Moraine Valley Community College and considering careers in psychology. "We were friends with a CNA (certified nursing assistant) who already worked at Smith Village. So, we got to see how the CNAs help residents," said Jocelyne. "That experience caused us to switch our career plans to nursing."

Following their new career path, the sisters enrolled in MVCC's Basic Nurse Assistant Training Program, which both started in August of 2018 and completed in December of 2018.

The Garcia sisters, now age 21, say they felt "very motivated" to do well in the program because they hoped for future employment as CNAs at Smith Village. They also wanted to take advantage of Smith Village's new tuition reimbursement program, which will reimburse their in-district tuition costs at Moraine Valley Community College as soon as they complete one year of employment as CNAs. "A year is nothing," said Jacquelene. "That time goes by really fast. This is a great program."

After they passed state certification exams with the Illinois Health Care Registry coordinated by the Illinois Department of Public Health this past February, Smith Village hired the sisters as CNAs. Since then, from 2:30 to 10:30 p.m., three to four evenings a week, they assist Smith Village residents in the skilled nursing care wing.

"We love working with the residents," said Jacquelene. "Many are very kind, and they like to tell stories about when they were young."

The twins don't seem to mind that people sometimes confuse them. "One resident liked to talk with me, and after I left, he picked up the conversation with my sister, thinking she was me," said Jocelyne.

"Sometimes when people realize they've done something like this, they say, 'Wait a minute. Are you two twins?" said Jacquelene. "A lot of people call us 'the twins.""

Having settled into their new roles as CNAs, the twins anticipate receiving their tuition reimbursement checks for about

\$1,800 each in February 2020.

"For 19th Ward residents who might advantage take of the program, the reimbursement helps to significantly defray costs of slightly higher, out-of-district tuition," said Karen Jellema, HR director for Smith Senior Living.

"Smith Village, which currently employs 76 CNAs, and its sister community, Smith Orland Crossing in Park, intend to use the reimbursement program to attract and retain more CNAs who are so well-trained," she said.

"The fact that Moraine Valley has such an excellent CNA program is why we chose to partner with its nursing program," said Jellema. "Moraine Valley nursing students complete some of their clinical work here. We have experience and a long history with the school and their programs."

"Moraine Valley is a great

school, and this is a great program," said Michelle Harnell, who recently joined Smith Village as director of Nursing. Harnell had served on the advisory board for MVCC's CNA program with her previous employer. She looks forward to continuing to serve on the advisory board in her new capacity at Smith Village. "I anticipate more good talent from Moraine Valley, including more advanced care training for CNAs.

# **Overcoming perils of sitting, finding a chair that fits**

Mercy Circle provides short-term stay rehab, therapies for residents

Most residents of Mercy Circle, continuing care retirement а community at 3659 West 99th Street in Chicago, and those benefiting short-term stay from rehab programs there may no longer find themselves sitting at a desk for hours a day. Many people, including older adults, may not realize, however, how much time they actually spend sitting while engaged in activities or simply relaxing, said Joanna Ruzich MHS, CCC-SLP, Mercy Circle's rehab manager for physical, occupational and speech therapy.

During an open house from 11am until 2pm on Sunday, May 19, Ruzich will guide visitors as they test a variety of chairs to experience the features that work best for them. She'll also provide tips about how to properly get in and out of a chair to avoid falling and other risks.

According to a study published in the Annals of Internal Medicine in 2015, the average person spends approximately one-half of waking hours sitting. Adds Dr. I-Min Lee, a professor of medicine at Harvard Medical School, older women are sedentary two-thirds of their waking hours.

A growing body of evidence suggests sitting for too many hours is hazardous to your health, risking obesity, diabetes and cardiovascular disease, among other conditions. Sitting too much also slows metabolism and even can cause chronic pain and lead to social isolation.

But sitting too long watching television or enjoying a hobby isn't the only risk associated with inactivity. "Getting out of a chair also can pose problems," says Ruzich, who promotes getting involved in social activities to reduce a sense of isolation that often accompanies many activities when sitting.

Ruzich applies guidelines for finding the best chair for people with mobility challenges that was published this January by Pamela Harrel in Pain-Free Living. Ruzich recommends these guidelines for her PT clients at Mercy Circle.

"Try on" chairs, just like you'd make sure a pair of new shoes are comfortable before you select and pay for them.

- 1. The seat of the chair should be firm and sufficiently deep so your entire back rests against the seat back and the seat itself supports your upper legs.
- 2. The width of the chair should comfortably accommodate your girth.
- 3. Look for lumbar support to protect your back because

sitting adds more stress to a person's spine.

- 4. Make sure the chair's seat is the right height so your legs don't become numb or tingle because your feet don't touch the floor.
- 5. Confirm your descent and ascent, as part of the sitting process, does not put undue stress of your joints.
- 6. Determine how the arm rests on a chair help you stabilize yourself when you sit down and make it easier to get in and out of the chair.

These tips will not only make you more comfortable, they also will protect you from putting strain on your body getting in and out of chairs.

At Mercy Circle's May 19 open house Ruzich will underscore these points. Light refreshments will be served, and there is ample parking in Mercy Circle's lot. For further information, call 773-253-3600.
