111th Street Streetscape Coming to Mt. Greenwood

The Chicago Department of Transportation (CDOT) is currently working to bring Streetscape Improvements to the 111th Street Commercial Corridor from Homan Avenue (3400 W) to Sacramento Avenue (3000 W). Streetscape projects improve the appearance of the area and attract new businesses and shoppers. This project will include widened sidewalks with new curb and gutter, full width roadway resurfacing, ornamental street lighting, pedestrian safety improvements, red stamped crosswalks, trees, benches, bike racks, sidewalk medallions and planters, hanging

flower baskets, and light pole identifiers. This phase of streetscape represents a \$6.9 million investment in our community, with all design costs coming from the 111th Street TIF and construction costs funded by the State of Illinois.

This project is currently in the design phase with final plans expected in February, 2022. Construction bids are tentatively scheduled to be announced in Spring, 2022 with work beginning in late 2022. The project is expected to be largely completed by the end of 2023. Please note, this timeframe is tentative and largely dependent on the

Road Home Program Sends Thanks

Dear Alderman O'Shea, his staff, community friends, supporters and business owners:

On behalf of all of us at the Road Home Program at Rush University Medical Center I would like to thank you for your incredible support of the Help-A-Hero campaign.

This summer, particularly through the month of June which is PTSD Awareness Month, the Operation Help-A-Hero has generated nearly \$20,000 to provide mental health services to area veterans and their families! This partnership between the 19th Ward and the Road Home Program at Rush University Medical Center sought to demonstrate our community's support for our veterans while raising funds to provide much needed mental health services. These funds allow our program to continue to offer mental health services regardless of their ability to pay. To all those who participated in this campaign, I thank you for joining us in our mission. Because of you we can continue to support veterans and their families on their "Road Home".

Together, we are improving the quality of life for individuals who have served our country. Your support of the Road Home Program enables us to meet this moment and continue as a permanent, sustainable resource for the Chicago area.

We know that the work we are doing is literally changing lives, and even more so, it's shattering the myth that PTSD is untreatable or that it's no use getting help. The Road Home Program is committed to healing the invisible wounds of war faced by veterans, military families, and active duty service members as a result of their service to our country. Established in 2014 as post 9/11 veterans returned home to inadequate mental health services, our program is now at the forefront of evidence based treatment for PTSD and trauma.

The Road Home Program offers traditional outpatient services, support groups and our acclaimed 2-week IOP (Intensive Outpatient Program). The 2-week IOP includes personalized mental health care, peer-to-peer outreach, moral injury counseling, military sexual trauma treatment and wellness resources to veterans and their families. Participants receive roughly six months of therapy condensed into 2 weeks which produces rapid symptom reduction and increased motivation. These outcomes allow participants to return home and re-engage with families, jobs and communities.

Society has only recently begun to recognize the wide range of difficulties faced during the transition from military service to civilian life. That process often includes post-traumatic stress disorder, traumatic brain injury, depression, anxiety and economic hardships; these issues have only been exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. This year alone, military suicides have increased by 20%. Simply put, the need for these services for veterans, service members and their families has never been greater.

Operation Help-A-Hero provided much needed funds to the Road Home Program. Equally important, the campaign also allowed Chicagoans to actively demonstrate their support for military families by displaying yard signs or wearing T-Shirts. In a time when so many veterans struggle in silence, all efforts to raise morale are greatly appreciated.





Smith Village resident Edwina Justice publishes series of travel books

Taking six cruises, all on small ships exploring different parts of the United States from 2017 through fall 2019, inspired Edwina Justice to share her experiences. The Smith Village resident cruised the Great Lakes, Chesapeake Bay, the Mississippi

River (twice!), Puget Sound and the San Juan Islands, Columbia and Snake Rivers.

Originally, she did not plan to turn these adventures into a series of books, but soon after she returned home, the COVID-19 pandemic struck. Justice found herself searching for a project. "I'm not one to enjoy just sitting around chatting," she explains. "I prefer to be working on something." The first five books in her series "Cruising through the Blues," is available on Apple Books and one more title is coming soon.

The online series allows readers to view videos like a piece she edited to compare stunning shades of blue in the Great Lakes. Her memories and observations offer insights provide insights into the uplifting power of travel.

Justice is no stranger to writing as a form of therapy. When she was widowed in 2012, she temporarily lost her zest for life. After a year of mourning, she realized she had to do something to feel more like herself. Justice taught math to seventh and eighth grade Chicago Public School students for 42 years, so she decided to write a math textbook. From 2013 until 2016, she found purpose in publishing four math books on Apple Books.

"The project kept me alive, but after a few years I felt I needed to try something new," she explains.



"I was a little nervous about traveling alone as a senior citizen," she says, but she didn't let her fears stop her.

Justice has useful tips for older adults who may feel hesitant about traveling.

For her first excursion, Justice traveled with a group called Road Scholars, a group specializing in trips for older adults. Although she was a solo traveler, being part of a group made her feel safe and simplified the logistics.

Try a cruise

"Cruising is great because you don't have to continually pack and unpack," says Justice. "I prefer smaller ships that carry 200 or fewer people. In fact, she compares the service and security of the smaller cruise lines to her community at Smith Village. "Both settings make me feel comfortable and very secure," she says.



Senator Cunningham helps neighborhood businesses with new state law

A legislative effort championed by Senator Bill Cunningham to modernize the state's alcohol distribution rules will soon provide a boost to several local businesses. House Bill 2620, will allow independent brewers to distribute their products directly to local bars, restaurants, and liquor stores.

"We've seen an explosion of small beer, wine, and mead makers in recent years, and they've become staples of our local bar and restaurant scene," said Cunningham. "People want to be able to buy their favorite products at local grocery and liquor stores, and we should make that easier to do."

Under current Illinois law, most companies that produce alcohol have to sell their products to local grocery and liquor stores through a third-party distributor. Tracing back to the post-prohibition era, this set up is meant to help prevent the unregulated sale of alcohol and aid in the collection of alcohol-related taxes.

While this system is not difficult to navigate for large companies, small breweries and wineries sometimes find it hard to get their products into local stores where demand is greatest. By allowing small breweries and wineries to self-distribute, they can avoid the prohibitive costs of distribution contracts and enable their businesses to grow. Once the companies reach a specified salesgrowth threshold, they would have to use the third-party distribution system.

The new law will enable local businesses like Horse Thief Hollow, Open Outcry Brewing Company, and Wild Blossom Meadery & Winery sell their product in local restaurants and retail outlets for the first time.

"Many of our local microbreweries and meaderies struggled to stay open during the pandemic," Cunningham said. "Allowing them to reach their customers more easily will help them recover and keep their doors open."

Cunningham's legislation will also help independent grocery and liquor stores compete with national chains and big box outlets by allowing them to enter into group purchasing agreements for alcohol. Currently, independent stores struggle to offer competitive prices to customers because they can't make low-cost, high-volume wholesale purchases like national chain outlets can. HB 2620 will modernize long standing regulations and allow small businesses in Illinois to band together with their peers and make volume purchases of wines and spirits as one group.

"Now more than ever, government has to eliminate out-dated regulations that make it difficult for small businesses to compete against corporate giants," Cunningham said. "Not only will we help our local businesses thrive, but we will hold down costs for consumers."








The residents have no idea how much they helped me during that difficult time."


