

When Chicago Police Officers are hired, they receive a new bulletproof vest. However, a vest isn't bulletproof forever.

It wears out. It breaks down. It needs to be replaced every 5 years. Just one bullet permanently damages a vest, making it unusable. Chicago Police Officers are responsible for replacing their own vests. At \$500 or more per vest, in addition to other equipment and uniform expenses, the costs can quickly add up. That's why we need your help.

The Chicago Police Memorial Foundation has paid out more than \$5.8 million dollars to purchase over 13,500 replacement vests for Chicago Police Officers with 991 vests supplied in 2024. The initiative is ongoing, and the foundation expects to provide at least 1,000 vests in 2025.

This event has raised over \$500,000 to date.







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Free Online Tax Filing Now Available for Many Illinois Residents

With this year's tax season upon us, State Senator Bill Cunningham is urging his constituents to see if they are eligible to participate in the state's new IRS Direct File service, which will allow qualifying Illinois residents to file their income tax returns online for free.

"Before the internet age, those of us who did our own taxes filled out our tax returns on paper and mailed them to the IRS. The only cost was the price of the postage stamp," Cunningham said. "Now, more than 90 percent of Americans file electronically, and it can cost up to \$100 or more."

"Finally, thanks to an agreement reached by the Illinois Department of Revenue and the IRS, we have a free electronic filing option."


Governor JB Pritzker announced news of the agreement shortly after the start of the new year. He estimates that two million eligible Illinois taxpayers will now be able to use Direct File to electronically prepare and file their 2024 federal tax returns for free.

"As we approach tax season, it is crucial that Illinoisians and their families have the resources needed to file their 2024 federal tax returns," Pritzker said. "Direct File will no doubt put money typically spent on tax preparation services back into the pockets of hardworking families across Illinois."

Direct File was initially launched as a test program by the IRS in a handful of states. Following a successful pilot, the service has become a permanent option, with up to 25 states expected to participate this year. The IRS estimates that over 30 million taxpayers will be eligible for Direct File during the 2025 tax filing season. It is an online service that is accessible on mobile phones, laptops, tablets, or desktop computers. Users will have access to a chatbot for guidance in both English and Spanish. It simplifies tax filing by providing a checklist and a guide to help navigate the process.

However, not all tax filers will be able to use Direct File. High earners and taxpayers who typically file complicated returns may not be eligible. Anyone with these tax situations is likely **ineligible**:

- Wages in excess of \$200,000 for an individual filer or \$250,000 for a married couple filing jointly.
- Unreported cash income, like tips.


- like ride sharing or delivery services.
- Anyone claiming itemized deductions.

Additionally, tax filers who receive income from pensions and other retirement plans are currently ineligible. However, the IRS has announced that it plans to open the Direct File portal to those with retirement income before the end of the filing deadline this year – hopefully in March.

City of Chicago Recycling Schedule & New Tools for Residents

The Department of Streets and Sanitation recently introduced the new Recycle Coach education app designed to bring hyper-local waste and recycling information directly to city residents. The new mobile and smartphone app is available at no cost to Chicago through a partnership with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) and Recycle Coach. It advises residents on waste and recycling schedules and proper waste management to decrease contamination at material recoverv facilities, increase the diversion of materials from landfills, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Chicago residents can also access the Recycle Coach tool at chicagorecycles.org and input an address to receive customized waste and recycling information specific to where they live including:

- collection and event calendars
- updates on service changes
- a comprehensive database on what is and isn't recyclable, including local disposal information for common and uncommon items

That means every gallon of gas pumped will generate 15 cents for the Get Behind the Vest Campaign.

"Chicago Police officers have extremely difficult jobs and see and experience things that most of us could never imagine," said Alderman O'Shea. "We must provide our officers with all the tools possible to ensure that they are safe and will return home to their loved ones at the end of each shift. It is crucial that Chicago Police officers have access to equipment with the latest advancements in technology. The funds raised through the Get Behind the Vest Pancake Breakfast and the Vest-A-Thon will help to make that possible."

Over the past 11 years, Alderman O'Shea's Get Behind the Vest Pancake Breakfast has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars used to purchase bullet proof vests for Chicago Police officers. Vests need to be replaced every five years. After receiving a complimentary vest when they join the force, officers are responsible for purchasing their replacement at a cost of at least \$600. To date, the Chicago Police Memorial Foundation has replaced over 13,000 vests for officers with another 1000 projected for 2025.

Alderman O'Shea sits on the Chicago Police Memorial Foundation Advisory Board and is part of the Chicago Police Chaplains Ministry Board of Directors. He represents the communities of Beverly, Morgan Park, and Mount Greenwood where thousands of first responders reside.

The Get Behind the Vest Pancake Breakfast is generously cohosted by Saint John Fisher parish, the Harrigan Family, and the Original Pancake House – Beverly.

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The much anticipated final phase of streetscape for the 95th Street business corridor is scheduled to begin this spring. Building on the success of the first three phases of this work, the final phase will improve the area from Wood Street to Ashland Avenue. The project will include full width roadway resurfacing, new curbs, new sidewalk and ADA ramps, pedestrian refuge islands, new ornamental street lighting with energy efficient LED lighting, stamped crosswalks, paver parkways with new trees, site furnishings, light pole community identifiers, landscaped planters, and an improved connection to the Major Taylor Trail.


The final phase of streetscape represents a \$5.9 million investment in our community.



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Macs with Mercy Helps Pat's Pantry Mark Five Years of Service

When Patrick Turney died suddenly at the age of 23, in September of 2019, his mother sought a way to share his spirit with others. Kathy Turney ultimately found comfort by establishing a food pantry in her son's name. Friends and neighbors rallied to ensure Pat's Pantry would brighten the lives of others - just like Pat, whom friends and neighbors had dubbed "the mayor of Mt. Greenwood," his mother recalls.

"It is so gratifying that so many people I did not even know joined our team," Turney recently said of the pantry, located at Community Church, 3509 W. 111th Street in Chicago. "Alderman Matt O'Shea and his staff, as well as so many others, stepped up to support our new community service." Since 2021, Macs with Mercy, an intergenerational coalition of Mother McAuley students' clubs and Mercy Circle residents, meet monthly during the school year to support the mission of Pat's Pantry.

Today, Pat's Pantry serves more than three dozen families every Wednesday. "We are grateful to Kathy for finding the courage to convert her profound loss into a way of providing comfort to others. Our community shines brightest when we work together, "stated O'Shea who attended January's meeting. "Seeing McAuley students and Mercy Circle residents work together is a heartwarming example of that spirit."



On Thursday, January 16th, Macs with Mercy kicked off 2025 by planning an ambitious food drive. The school's Varsity Club and Action Reaction Club students met with Mercy Circle residents to create an outreach campaign that spotlighted specific non-perishable items the pantry needs. After Turney shared her story about founding Pat's Pantry, O'Shea talked about how most people know neighbors who experience food insecurity right in the 19th Ward.

Inspired by what they heard, small groups claimed the two or three specific kinds of products they would champion and created 30 flyers to promote awareness about what to donate. "Many readers of 'The 19th Ward Quarterly' have seen these flyers as part of this awareness campaign, on eblasts from elected officials and community organizations, as well as through social media channels for the 19th Ward, the Village of Evergreen Park, the Beverly Area Planning Association, Mother McAuley, and Mercy Circle," explained Katie McKirdie, Mercy Circle's life enrichment coordinator. "The response has been tremendous. People dropped off their contributions at our main entrance, and we had to make room for more each morning."

On Thursday, February 13th, Macs with Mercy reconvened – this time with National Honor Society students from McAuley – to organize all the donations for transport to Pat's Pantry, and to gauge which flyers attracted the most responses.

While the Macs with Mercy food drive has concluded, Pat's Pantry welcomes volunteers; picks up food donations on Wednesdays between 3-6 p.m. and accepts monetary and gift card donations. To learn more, please contact Kathy Turney at patspantrymtgcc@ gmail.com.

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Heart-Shaped Puzzles Designed to Uplift Veterans on Valentine's Day

For the 10th consecutive year, St. Cajetan School's student council members and Smith Village residents joined forces to create a special Valentine for each of the 38 veterans now in the Road Home Program at Rush University Medical Center. On Tuesday, February 11th, this intergenerational group of more than 45 newly deputized Cupids gathered at Smith Village where they painted and wrote messages - on 12 x 16-inch heartshaped wooden puzzles - for each of the veterans in the Road Home Program, which provides mental health and wellness programs for those who served in several branches of military service, the National Guard and reserves.

"On Valentine's Day, we gave each veteran a beautifully decorated puzzle with words of encouragement. These hand-painted gifts sparked joy in the veterans we are serving. They also ignited a bit of competition about how quickly each could assemble all the pieces," said Modie Lavin, USMC Gold Star Mother, who is the family coordinator for the Road Home Program.

"We are inspired by the bravery of veterans who fought for people they don't even know. It is important that we remember them, especially when they experience invisible and visible wounds," said Rose Connolly, an eighth grader who is president of the school's student council. "Making these puzzles expresses our appreciation to veterans we never met. We think it's important to recognize how they protect us," added Finn O'Malley, a member of the student council.

"That the United States is a country at all is thanks to the heroic acts of generations of those who join the military. So we created a keepsake for each of these brave men and women, to acknowledge how their service protects our freedom both on our soil and around the world," added Dave Degnan, president of Smith Village's resident council. Degnan served in the Air Force from 1961 through 1965.

"Valentines for Vets is one of my favorite collaborations in our

community," stated Alderman Matt O'Shea. "While war is part of the human condition, the kindness and thoughtfulness of citizens like Smith Village residents and St. Cajetan students make a difference not only to the veterans but also to their families and friends. In fact, this annual outreach project elevates all who participate."

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Creative Chicago Reuse Exchange (CCRx)

As the snow is falling and the winds are blowing, are your closets calling for a clean out? When you open a cabinet or a drawer and see all the things that you store, are you wondering how to get them out the door? But you think they are still good, they work just fine, I want them to be used another time. Often you close the drawer, snap the lid on the bin, leave the cabinet and continue the habit. Not because you want the clutter. You'd feel better giving the items to another to have a new life. But finding a spot that will appreciate and use your "what-not" items seem an impossible chore. Well, it is a chore no more. There is a warehouse close to home that collects, sorts, and finds new use for what some may consider refuse - The Creative Chicago Reuse Exchange (CCRx).

Creative Chicago Reuse Exchange (CCRx), https://www.creatviechirx.org/ is a one-of-a-kind store dedicated to the reduction of material waste and the creative reuse of resources. A resource for teachers, artists, and non-profits looking to find new life in surplus materials, supplies, and equipment, CCRx's mission is to promote sustainability and help the community by providing access to resources that would otherwise be discarded. Lucky for us, CCRx's warehouse is in nearby AuburnGresham, at 2124 W. 82nd Place.

CCRx is developing a supply chain to recirculate and repurpose everyday materials cast aside by organizations yet highly useful to educators, artists, non-profits, community groups, and others. These materials include all forms of paper, digital media, pens, pencils, textbooks, manipulatives, fabric, design samples, costumes and props, tools, musical and scientific instruments and a host of other office and art supplies. These supplies are a pervasive and pernicious form of waste - seldom recyclable, highly variable, and in bountiful surplus in some settings while maddeningly scarce in others. These supplies are typically not accepted by normal resale and second-hand channels, yet, every year, Chicago's 24,000+ public school teachers and 13,000+ community, social service and churchbased organizations scramble to acquire them. Concurrently, businesses, wealthier school districts, and consumers dispose of millions of dollars in surplus at considerable cost to themselves and to the environment because supply drastically outweighs demand.

Launched in 2017, inspired by successful models in other cities, CCRx is an established 501c3 nonprofit that redistributes donated surplus materials, equipment, and supplies. CCRx founder and Executive Director, Barbara Koenen, worked for more than twenty years for the City of Chicago Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events designing programs and resources for artists and small arts organizations. Barb discovered NYC's Materials for the Arts on a business trip in 2015. She was impressed by its success in supplying and inspiring teachers and nonprofits across New York City by redistributing donated materials and providing professional development based in reuse. She believed Chicago could greatly benefit from the same service and has dedicated herself to this goal ever since. Barbara is supported by seven parttime contractors, consisting of primarily artists and teaching artists. The main beneficiaries are Chicago

teachers and students, non-profit organizations, and arts and community groups, but CCRx is open to all promoting creativity, a circular economy, and environmental stewardship through creative reuse programming, products and partnerships.

CCRx's goal is to educate and empower people to reduce waste, reimagine surplus and make creative reuse a fundamental part of the collective infrastructure. The Intro to CCRx video is a great way to get to know more and is available on the CCRx website. The warehouse is open by appointment on Wednesdays from 10 a.m. – 5 p.m., Thursdays from 12 -7 p.m., and on Saturdays from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. Please contact info@creativechirx. org for more information.





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




Peace by Piece and Yak and Yarn Collaborate with Miss Purl on 95th Street

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Smith Village Feels Like Home; South Shore Couple Energized by Community's Spirit

David and Theresa Boone explored several senior living communities before choosing Smith Village. They immediately felt at home because their children began their education at Morgan Park Academy. Then, son David Jr. attended De La Salle Institute and daughter Nicole, St. Ignatius College Prep before heading off to college.



Once they'd moved in, on December 11, 2023, they discovered that five other alumni of their alma mater, Tennessee State University, also live at Smith Village. At TSU, said Theresa, "A football player I knew introduced me to his teammate, who was the quarterback. David invited me to a basketball game scheduled for the next day. It's been a fairytale ever since De-

> cember 4, 1962." David was a native of Hampton, VA. Theresa attended TSU because she couldn't enroll at the then segregated University of Mississippi in her hometown, Oxford, Mississippi.

"We believe that good race relations simply require getting people to know each other. That's how we live our lives and taught our children to do so as well," states David. When David Jr., became the only African American player on his De La Salle team, David invited the whole team for hot dogs and a party at their South Shore home, to show them that Black people lived like they did. Theresa graduated first, in 1963, then moved to Chicago to work as a substitute teacher for Chicago Public Schools. David soon followed, renting a room and working in restaurants during that summer. Before he returned to TSU, they married on August 17, 1963. "We travelled to be with each other once a month until we started our home together in Chicago," Theresa explained. "I was a 'cougar,' and David needed to complete his degree."


In 1965, David started teaching physical education and coaching football at Hirsch High School. He left to become assistant principal at Farragut High School and then Hyde Park High School for 20 years before retiring. Theresa focused on teaching elementary school. A career highlight: in 1965, she opened Beasley Academic Center, a Chicago Public School at 52nd and State Street, where she taught fifth graders. After 13 years, she taught at Burnside Elementary School until she retired in 1991.

The Boones are active members of St. Mark Methodist Church at 84th and South Lawrence Avenue where David has served as an usher every Sunday morning for more than two decades. While still an assistant principal, he became a funeral director, with Theresa handling the paperwork and amenities.

"Theresa is my rock," said David, who served as president of the National Funeral Directors & Morticians Association in 2005 and 2006. "We could only add this responsibility to our other commitments because we are a team. We are proud that over time, several members from one family have turned to us when someone close to them passed. Our goal was to help people make good decisions during a difficult time."

The Boones are united by shared goals, and they make collaboration look easy, but they maintain their own perspectives. When asked why they chose Smith Village, David immediately responded, "On our tour, I was fascinated by a robot delivering meals to tables in the dining room. I had not seen this innovation elsewhere." Added Theresa, "Not cooking every day sold me. Now it's all the competitive activities including chair volleyball for me and bean bags and Bocci ball for David. The tipping point, however, was that Nicole and her family live near by while our son lives in Atlanta."
